Historically, Women were basically meant to maintain household order, to encourage faith and moral development of the family and to be subordinate to men. Women who failed to respect accepted gender roles were considered dangerous and were treated harshly, up to and including being publicly reprimanded, shunned or in very serious cases, tried for witchcraft. For example a woman that had the audacity to speak in church faced harsh admonishment by the community. Women relinquished ownership of their property of their husband.

As it was then "Society looked at women as asexual beings; people with neither feelings nor a life of their own" (Wayne, 2007, p.17). Women were taught reading and writing and wifely responsibilities in school and by their early teens were expected to participate fully in completing household chores rather than gaining further education. Not until the industrial revolution and Civil War which resulted in employment opportunities for women as they filled the roles vacated by enlisted men did women had opportunity to work publicly. Having proved to men that they were capable of working outside the home, women continued to have employment opportunities after the war ended. Ever since then we have numerous pieces of legislation which has been passed cementing the rights women in society. Equal representation of women has been recognized internationally as an important measure to achieving the Sustainable Development Goals of any country or nation. Hence, in recent years, women's participation in politics and decision-making has received significant attention across the world. However, women remain seriously underrepresented in decision-making positions.

It is true that more than half percent of the world's population are women but the lack of common and equal ground for participation as incapacitated them in contributing and providing the required intellectual and political decision making skills as compared to their counter parts at all levels of government. So that women's equal participation in decision-making and politics is not only a demand for simple justice or democracy, but a necessary precondition for women's interests to be taken into account. Below are few statistics on participation of women in the world;

 Women has occupied executive government position in about 22 countries of the world 119 countries have never had a woman leader. Just 10 countries have women Head of state and 23 counties have women Head of Government and interestingly the five most commonly held portfolios by women ministers are: Family/children/youth/elder/y/disabled; followed by Social affairs;

- 2. Women in national parliaments, only 25 per cent of all national parliamentarians are women, up from 11 per cent since 1995 in which only four countries have 50 per cent, or more women in parliament in single or lower houses: Rwanda with 61 per cent, Cuba with 53 per cent, Bolivia with 53 per cent, and the United Arab Emirates with 50 per cent. Globally, there are 27 States in which women account for less than 10 per cent of parliamentarians in single or lower houses, including four single/lower chambers with no women at all.
- Data from 133 countries shows that women constitute 2.18 million (36 per cent) of elected members in local deliberative bodies. Only two countries have reached 50 per cent, and an additional 18 countries have more than 40 per cent women in local government.
- 4. Women are responsible for 60% of work done globally yet earn just 10% income and 1% of property. In Africa, 70% of women are excluded financially. The continent has a US\$42 billion financing gap between men and women.

The central objective of this discourse is to examine how achieving equal participation of women can solve the problem of inequality, indignity, insecurity and underdevelopment in the world, particularly in Africa. Despite this numerical strength and potentials, Women have been subjugated, relegated, degraded, oppressed, victimized, exploited and enslaved. Their contributions to society have been underestimated and undermined over the years.

It is important that we affirm, validate, and celebrate the role Women play in Society beyond their role as Child bearers and Primary caregivers. We have seen women achieve great heights in Society, in Industry, in Law, in Politics, in Agriculture, in Education and in virtually all strata. This year, AWLA is giving the African Woman wings to soar. We are creating a platform to honor and celebrate African Women who have taken the bull by the horn and chosen to challenge the barriers and have rolled the barriers off as well as Empower more Women to challenge and roll off the barriers.
